1. Introduction

The aim of this module is to develop the student's conceptual understanding of the curriculum, curriculum development processes and second level curriculum programmes. Students will reflect on the evidence of curriculum ideologies in the Irish education system today. Factors influencing curriculum developments, such as sustainability, technology, wellbeing etc. are discussed; as are the role and remit of key stakeholders, such as the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment. Students engage with key curriculum documentation for junior cycle, Transition Year and Leaving Certificate Applied. They consider the role of the teacher as a curriculum maker and research the supports and resources available to them in their practice.

Students will also learn about the professional role of the teacher in the wider context of a school community through a series of lectures on Professional Practice for the Classroom (PPC).

2. What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students will be able to:

- 1. Describe the main aspects of curriculum (formal, informal, hidden etc).
- 2. Outline the main characteristics of curriculum ideologies.
- 3. Consider factors currently influencing second-level curriculum development.
- 4. Identify the role and remit of the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment.
- 5. Describe the main features of Junior Cycle, Transition Year and Leaving Certificate Applied curriculum documentation.

- 6. Communicate and engage with the various members of a school community in a professional manner (pupils, staff, parents and management).
- 7. Develop an understanding of and implement national and school policies.
