1. Introduction

Professional Practice offers learning challenges for students that expand their capacities and introduce further models of engagement and action to complement their understanding and experience. The module requires joint learning contexts for groups of students and staff creating an outward facing potential. The module requires student participation, engagement and the ability to work and coordinate with others in developing a creative momentum and output.

The module aims to introduce students to working collaboratively in a situated context – the intensive is based around a set theme or location. For example, indicative themes are: site specificity; community and connectivity; sites of practice; infrastructure; distribution; systems and circuits. Depending on the headline knowledge domain, the intensive aims to immerse students in a 2-week learning experience that asks, for example, what does it mean to be site specific, across critical, material and discursive modes of engagement and practice.

The intensive is taught primarily through workshops to encourage situated and hands-on learning with skills acquisition.

The aims of this module are to:

- Encourage active consideration of different working contexts and situations.
- Deepen knowledge of working methods and professional practices within and beyond your specific discipline.
- Develop opportunities for collaborative ethos and interdisciplinary engagement.
- Foster broader and deeper professional and creative responsibility and engagement.
- Understand diverse connections and relationships between fields of practice.
- Develop a greater awareness of the relationship between art and audience.

2. What will I learn?

- 2. EXPAND: Evidence levels of professional development and a deeper understanding of the perspectives of Fine Art that augment your practice.
- 3. CRITICALLY REFLECT: Demonstrate informed decision making and critical reflection in context.
- 4. CONSOLIDATE: Evidence an evolution and synthesis of practice

Module content

The aim is to liaise with an external partner or to act independently with a site. NCAD and the partner may host some of the workshops or provide a site of interest. Indicative partners are not limited to arts organisations.

Teaching methods include: workshops, seminars, group tutorials, group work and site visits.

10. How will I have the chance to evaluate the module?

It is important to NCAD that students inform the development of teaching and learning at NCAD. We encourage all students to communicate their concerns and their observations about their study to members of staff so that any changes can be made in a timely manner.

About two-thirds of the way through the year, a student forum will be convened to gather students' comments about their study and the delivery of the programme.
