1. Introduction

In this module students develop competencies for independent thinking and learning, for self-directed research and for the establishment of professional art practices. Students develop a self-directed project for presentation and dissemination, and begin to locate their practice within current art discourse. They consider modes of making work, its production, and alternatives in relation to different ways of showing and sharing their work – its distribution.

The aims of this module are to:

- Encourage students to identify and develop research and interests in the making of work.
- Demonstrate the ability to synthesise research into practice.
- Enable students to develop and publicly present self- directed and collaborative work.
- Encourage resolved and considered production and presentation.
- Encourage and support collaborative enquiry and working.
- Encourage students to consider different working contexts and audiences.
- Work safely in relation to self and others.

2. What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students will be able to:

- 1. RESEARCH: Demonstrate the capacity to integrate research and personal interests in the development and production of artwork.
- 2. EXPERIMENT: Evidence the ability to develop and build on skills, ideas, know-how across creative experimentation, analysis, and critical reflection.

- 3. CONSOLIDATE: Apply appropriate skills to art practice that demonstrate an understanding of methodologies and processes relevant to their concerns.
- 4. DISSEMINATE: Evidence a critical understanding of the relationship between art, audience and context by situating work.

Module content

The module asks students to develop their skill base. This occurs in relation to technical considerations and the development of a creative momentum but also in relation to the wider considerations within a contemporary art practice.

For example, the module asks students to develop consideration and action in relation to who is the author of the artwork – is it the student, or the student and others in different collaborative or participatory ways? It will also ask students to consider the sites of how they present the artwork. Is it in group exhibition, is it sited in public? Is the viewer or the audience particular or general?

3. How will I learn?

Student engage in studio and art practices that build on their learning in the first trimester. They will continue to deploy spatial/studio, technical and teaching resources available in the College, and to deepen their engagement with online material, library resources and peer engagement. Through learning to learn, students will apply their developing knowledge to Studio practice, self-directed or collaborative inquiry, problem solving and evolving relationships to research, workshops, experimentation, testing, prototyping, through encountering contexts (within and outside of college), through, student initiative, student led on and off campus dissemination of work and developing consideration of audience.

Learning supports will include the library, Artists Talks Programme and a study visit/ field trip.

Significant course fees will be due in relation to a repeat.

It should be noted that successful resits will be capped at a pass mark of D-.

10. How will I have the chance to evaluate the module?
