## 1. Introduction

This module will enable learners to initiate and state a design project of their choice (by negotiation with their tutor/s) which will encompass information retrieval, collation and interpretation.

The module will develop the learner's ability to understand how to find scholarly and professional literature on the topic that interests them, and relate that literature to their research question. Their goal is to describe what is already known about their topic, how it has been researched by others, and how their question and the research methods they seek to employ differ from that of previous design researchers. This will then enable learners to develop a feasibility study where through a process of analysis and evaluation of a proposed project they will determine if it is required, appropriate and feasible.

This module aims to:

1. Promote the development of written communication skills (project proposals and reflective evaluation), oral communication skills (presentation and group debate) and problem-based learning.
2. Develop students' ability to identify a subject or issue within a professional, social and cultural context for applying design research.
3. Develop students' ability to determine if a project proposal is feasible within an academic and professional context.

## 2. What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students will be able to:

1. REVIEW: demonstrate the ability to identify and review existing literature to establish the design feasibility associated with a creative objective.

2. APPLY: demonstrate the ability to employ design practice & research methods, strategies and techniques to explore opportunities, options and the various boundaries of creative practice.
3. PROJECT MANAGE: demonstrate an ability to develop a viable project plan against given time scales and set stages.

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Students will learn through a combination of set activities within the studio and self-directed study within and outside the studio.

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The module is delivered in School of Design studios during trimester 3, the summer trimester.
