### 1. Introduction

This module is delivered as an Intensive Seasonal School designed as an opportunity to experience learning in a 'hot house' style, where ideation, approaches, processes and practices can be tested in a stimulating, immersive context.

For many artists, working in a healthcare setting for the first time can be a cultural shock, presenting unexpected responses to artistic interventions which would not arise in a mainstream arts context. For healthcare professionals, the actual arts experience may not match expectations.

The aims of this module are to:

• share their learning and professional development with peers, and interact with leading creative practitioners by developing a greater understanding of acute health environments as artists, designers, makers, curators or writers.

### 2. What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students will be able to:

- 1. CONSIDER: Demonstrate an ability to develop creative responses, making appropriate critical decisions.
- 2. ESTABLISH: Apply relevant personal and professional critical and practical skills to a set thematic project, working with and alongside peers.

3. CONSTRUCT: Communicate propositions effectively and fluently, to a high standard of finish, using platforms/media/artefacts combining text, image, object based materials as appropriate to the project.

#### **Module content**

This intensive learning module encourages dynamic peer learning in the context of the acute hospital setting. It will touch on themes of cultural identity, ageism, health systems/ intersections, pedagogies, policy - Through clinical reflective retrospective and imaginative workshops the learner will have a greater understanding of these environments. It will create creative shared opportunities and experience in the acute hospital setting and its relationship to the community.

This module addresses integrating the arts and the role creativity plays within acute health environments. It aims to develop a greater understanding of acute health environments.

The module is led by thought-leaders, and international practitioners, NGO Leads, Ageing and Arts, Clinicians and Allied Health Professionals alongside leading academics. Co-delivered this intensive learning module encourages dynamic peer learning in the context of a thematic project, workshops, seminars and conversations.

### 3. How will I learn?

Students will learn through a combination of set activities within the pathway studio and/or base room, and self-directed study within and outside the College.

### 10. How will I have the chance to evaluate the module?
