1. Introduction

Our contemporary world of digital and networked cultures raises issues and questions that can be purposefully addressed through Fine Art Media practices. Participants are challenged to engage critically with how meaning is made, how representations and encounters are produced, circulated, regulated and consumed in contemporary life, and act upon the ways in which value is constructed and understood by individuals and groups – in the contexts of local, national and global discourses. This Professional Certificate seeks to engage components selected from a larger hinterland of possible media practices and concerns.

The module encourages participants to integrate research, creative practice and contemporary methods, theory and contexts. The forces and themes that underpin our understanding of contexts are supported by an emergent situational awareness that offers a rich and potentially restless matrix.

The aims of this module are to:

- Support practitioners with requisite knowledge and skills to creatively contextualise their practice and imaginatively demonstrate its wider validity.
- Develop the participant's skills in research and the translation of findings into their creative practice.
- Critically evaluate and engage with contemporary debates regarding practice-based research, practice-led research and cognate creative methodologies.
- Assist participants in developing their own practice in relation to contemporary creative practice and discourse. This may be as an artist, maker, curator, educator, writer or other.

2. What will I learn?

On successful completion of this module students will be able to:

- 1. DEFINE: Demonstrate an outline knowledge and understanding of current media strategies and practices, utilised within contemporary art.
- 2. CHARACTERISE: Demonstrate a working knowledge of digital strategies, processes and practices within a contemporary context.
- 3. DISTINGUISH: Demonstrate the ability to undertake analysis, evaluation and synthesis of associated debates surrounding pre-production requirements and other materials as appropriate to a contemporary practice.
- 4. CRITIQUE: Examine professional practices, synthesise and reflect critically and collectively on the results of one's own work, and that of peers.

Module content

This module focuses on the development of contemporary works for public consumption using digital tools. It is an opportunity to initiate research and to be guided in the creation of contemporary works to communicate, mediate and disseminate the work of creative practitioners. This module offers creative practitioners a means to consider and frame their approaches to their material within a changing landscape.

Learners will be introduced to a range of digital technologies, critical theories of technology, creative approaches to technology, and the principles of socially engaged and site-specific creative practice using lab based, studio based and experiential tools.

Learners will have the opportunity to continue with their existing creative practice or develop a new project to challenge, examine and plan for new directional opportunities within the digital realm.

This module introduces fundamental principles, working methods, skills and theories that underpin contemporary art practice, within and extending beyond the digital world. The module sets out key aspects of professional practice, and the historical, theoretical, cultural and professional contexts, to form a strong knowledge base for creative practice. This supports a range of creative methodologies and techniques for the professional development, presentation and documentation of work.

This module functions as a foundational component for potential progression to a Creative Futures Professional Diploma or MA.

3. How will I learn?

Students will learn through a combination of set activities within a studio, in a situated environment or base or outdoor classroom, and self-directed study within and outside the College.
